Bill Waiser - Electrifying Rural Saskatchewan In the 1050s

Bill Waiser: Saskatchewan's historian - Dr. Bill Waiser (DLitt)

The University of Saskatchewan (USask) distinguished professor emeritus in the Department of History is a specialist in western and northern Canadian history, specifically Saskatchewan history. For Waiser, people and their stories have always been at the forefront of his interest in how the province was shaped and why he went into history as a career.



"Everyone has a story. I like research and uncovering new things," he said. "History is about looking for stories inside the bigger story. I try and write history that way." Waiser was born in Toronto, but visited his paternal grandparents' homestead in Manitoba every summer. He went to Trent University in Peterborough, Ont., where he studied with prominent Manitoba historian W.L. Morton, before coming to USask as a graduate student in western history. From there, he went on to have a distinguished and decorated career in his field.

In 2017, Waiser was named a member of the Order of Canada, the country's highest civilian honour. This recognition complemented his appointment to the Saskatchewan Order of Merit in 2006 and his election as a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada (RSC) in 2007. In 2018, Waiser earned the RSC's J.B. Tyrell medal for outstanding work in Canadian history and the Governor General's History Award for Popular Media (The Pierre Berton Award), as well as the Governor General Literary Award for Non-Fiction in 2016 for his book, *A World We Have Lost*.

Waiser's research was used in the exoneration of Chief Poundmaker, more than 130 years after the Plains Cree chief's conviction for treason-felony.

Bibi Baksh - Pabion Bird Notes Program

Bibi Baksh-Pabion develops and oversees communication strategies for BirdNote. Terri Berguld, Personal Security Devices Lifeline Canada

Program manager with Phillips Lifeline in Saskatchewan, Terri Berglund, said the device uses GPS signals to find people registered in their database. "It's a personal help button they wear on their wrist or around their neck," she said. "To get help they press the button, and it goes straight to our communicator centre in Toronto in under 30 seconds, so they can get the help they need." Berglund said Phillips Lifeline is in the works to become designated as a wandering device in the near future. Among other tools include The Missing Seniors Network to help locate wandering patients. The online website allows family and friends to register a senior with dementia.

Melissa Lowenberger Diabetes Presentation

Addison Sod House National Historic Site of Canada Kindersley, Saskatchewan

Address : Highway 21, Rural Municipality of Oakdale no. 320, Kindersley, Saskatchewan

With fewer than a handful of functioning sod houses in existence, this would definitely be a National Historic Site worth visiting. In 1911, a carpenter from Britain by the name of James Addison built a substantial sod house near Kindersley, Saskatchewan, and he built it to last. The key was a permanent, quality roof to protect from the elements.

The Addison Sod House National Historic Site of Canada is located in the rural municipality of Oakdale, Saskatchewan. Triangular-shaped dormers light the upper floor. Set back from the road the house forms the centre of an original prairie homestead amongst outbuildings surrounded by a garden and shelterbelt plantings. Official recognition refers to the sod house on its footprint.

Carpenter Jim Addison built Addison Sod House in 1909-1911 as the residence for his family on his homestead. The care with which the sods were prepared and constructed ensured that this house survived for much longer than many others of its kind.
